# Medications to Avoid Before Surgery

Information for when your doctor tells you to avoid aspirin, aspirin-like products, or other medications or supplements prior to surgery to prevent bleeding problems

To prepare for your surgery or procedure, your doctor has asked you to avoid certain medications. including aspirin and aspirin-like products, or other medications or supplements. This guide lists medicines (by generic and trade names) that you should avoid to prevent bleeding problems. This list is not complete. Other products or supplements may cause bleeding problems. Please review all medicines that you are taking with your doctor.

#### **Important Notes**

- Your doctor wants you to stop taking aspirin, aspirin-like products, or non-steroidal anti-inflammatory agents \_\_\_\_\_\_ days before your surgery or procedure. You may resume taking these products \_\_\_\_\_ days after your procedure.
- You may take acetaminophen (Tylenol®) for minor aches and pains.
- If you are unsure whether a medicine is safe to take before the time of your surgery or procedure, please ask your doctor or pharmacist.

#### **Coumadin (warfarin)**

Ask your doctor how many days BEFORE your surgery to stop taking this drug, and whether you will need bridge therapy with an injectable anticoagulant such as heparin or a low molecular weight heparin (enoxaparin; Lovenox).

#### **Herbal/vitamin supplements:**

Natural products, herbal medicinals, and other supplements **should be stopped seven days prior to surgery** and may be resumed when approved by your doctor.

Products that can increase the risk of bleeding associated with surgery include:
